- Influx of federal funding for LSL replacements to states
  - Bipartisan Infrastructure Law
  - American Rescue Plan Act
  - Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation (WIIN) Act Grants
- Agencies
  - U.S. Environmental Protection Agency
  - U.S. Department of Agriculture
  - U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development
  - U.S. Department of the Interior Bureau of Indian Affairs
- Nearly than one in four (24%) rural residents are people of color
  - Percent of rural population that is:

•	Latino/a/x	10.4%
•	Black	7.4%

• Mixed 4%
